

Rose Hill Community Centre

The previous Centre was near the Oval and before that it was a wooden hut that burnt down in 1955. The new centre was built in 2016, winning an OPT Award for the space it provides for the community of Rose Hill to enjoy.



Rose Hill Playing Field

"I love the rec in the Summer - all ages and backgrounds playing together"



"Georgian" Townhouses

These Georgian-style houses were built in 1935 to look like one grand house whilst being four separate dwellings.



Rose Hill Methodist Church

The congregation originally met in a cottage in Iffley village before this church was built in 1835.



Oxford's oldest Highway Stone

Look out for the oldest Highway stone in Oxfordshire which marked the main road between Oxford and London via Henley. It dates back to 1635!



Parade of Shops

"A great local resource" built in 1937 with turrets which give access to the flats above.

Cherry Blossom Trees

"In April, there are lovely blossom trees that bloom along Ashhurst Way"



Great Gardens!

Homes were built with extra spacious back gardens and shared front gardens for residents who moved out of the cramped conditions in Oxford's City Centre. The Housing Committee banned growing vegetables in front gardens, and an annual gardening competition was established in 1935 with cash prizes.



Littlemore Roundabout Underpass

Did you know some graffiti walls around Oxford are legal? The artwork changes all the time - be inspired!



Path by the Eastern-By-pass Rd

A particularly beautiful stroll in springtime when blossom and leaves are emerging.

Ancient Oak Trees

Several ancient oaks are still standing, left over from field boundaries and from an area called 'The Grove'. It was a woodland for over 1,000 years and was even mentioned in the Domesday book.



Queen Mary Trucks

The "Howard" houses on Mortimer Road were factory-made after WWII. They were delivered to site by RAF transporters called 'Queen Marys' which were normally used for carrying aircraft.



Rivermead Nature Park

Once used by the Baskerville Hounds, Rose Hill's Cycle Speedway team, it is now a "pretty and peaceful" Nature Park. There are streams, ponds, woodland and wildlife. What can you spot today?



Toads Crossing!

"Toads are often seen hopping between Lenthall Road and Eastchurch"



Iffley Glebe Field

Owned by OPT since 1996 the Glebe preserves Iffley's rural feel and provides ancient habitat for voles, insects, birds, bats, owls and more!

Lenthall Road Allotments

Seven acres of allotments were established in 1947 with more than 88 plots and a lovely view over Iffley Church towards Boars Hill.



Community Orchard at Rose Hill Primary

Created by the Rose Hill and Iffley Low Carbon Group, who also installed solar panels on the Community Centre. They planted over 600 trees on the rec and now run a repair cafe and swap shop.



The Oval

Since being created in 1945, the Oval has been home to many important Rose Hill Buildings including the old Community Centre, the Primary School and the new social housing scheme built in 2021.



Rose Hill Primary School

Built after World War II (1950), boys wore caps, girls wore berets, and all wore badges and ties.
